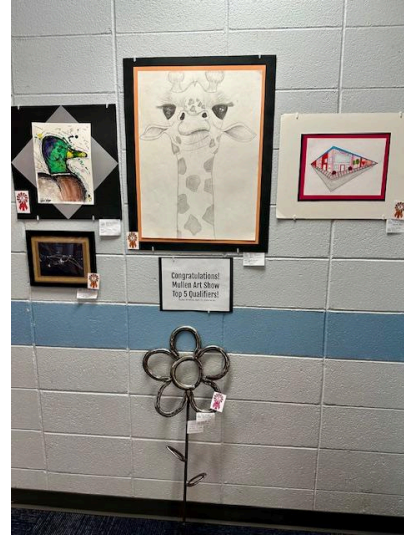

Conference and District Music

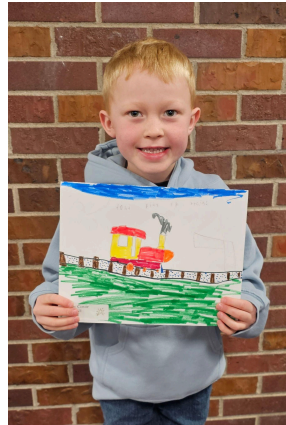
