The land. Always it is the land that determines man's destiny. Where Nature has been generous, men prosper; where she has skimped, life struggles. And so it is to the land that man pays homage.

Long ago, long before the dawn of human civilization, a huge inland sea lay in the rich and fertile area today known as the Nebraska Sandhills. As the ages passed, the waters left behind acre upon acre of rolling sand dunes. In the slow process of natural development, the dunes were stabilized with abundant, life-supporting grass which was to provide the basis for the now-booming economy.

Years passed, and this youthful nation became hungry for room and riches. This hunger motivated men to move west in search of a better life. Despite the earlier settling in many areas of Nebraska, Grant County remained unsettled until 1876, when the Nebraska legislature drew boundary lines and named the fledgling county for Ulysses $S$. Grant.

One large drawback to earlier settlement of the area was a lack of local governmental authority. With its natural remoteness, the country was an excellent retreat for outlaws and cattle rustlers; the ranchers had no protection except their own personal law enforcement. In 1886 Governor Thayer recognized the dilemma. His advisers suggested

he appoint R. M. "Bud" Moran as sheriff to clean up the entire southern Sandhills area. This pioneer lawman succeeded, and law and order reigned. A note of interest is that the first case tried in court at Hyannis in 1887 was for cattle stealing.

This panoramic view of Hyannis, taken in May of 1919, was a triumph of early photography. By this time, the town looks solid and prosperous.

The first street west of Main Street boasted houses with yards in 1895, but had little to offer in the way of trees. Traffic must have been light, considering the growth in the street it self.

As the area grew, religious and civic activities were a created new demands for institutions. The Congregational Church organized in 1889 and constructed a building in 1897. The Catholic Church was built in 1895 . Other early community institutions included the Bank of Hyannis established in 1893 and a one-room frame school built in 1889. Hyannis citizens have long been interested in politics, and it was with great enthusiasm that they welcomed Teddy Roosevelt on his "whistle stop" speaking tour during the 1904 presidential campaign. Cultural activities included concerts and plays at the Opera House, as evidenced by the playbill at the right.

But ultimately it is the people themselves who are remarkable. Some could not endure the devastating hardships of homesteading and were forced to leave, and some established the vast cattle empires which exist today. Some were famous, and some passed each day routinely. But all, regardless of station or achievement, left their mark upon the area and the culture. In the Centennial year, it seems fitting to pay homage to these true pioneers.
