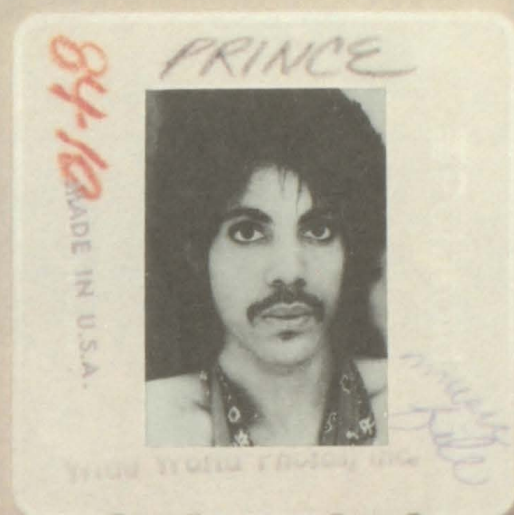

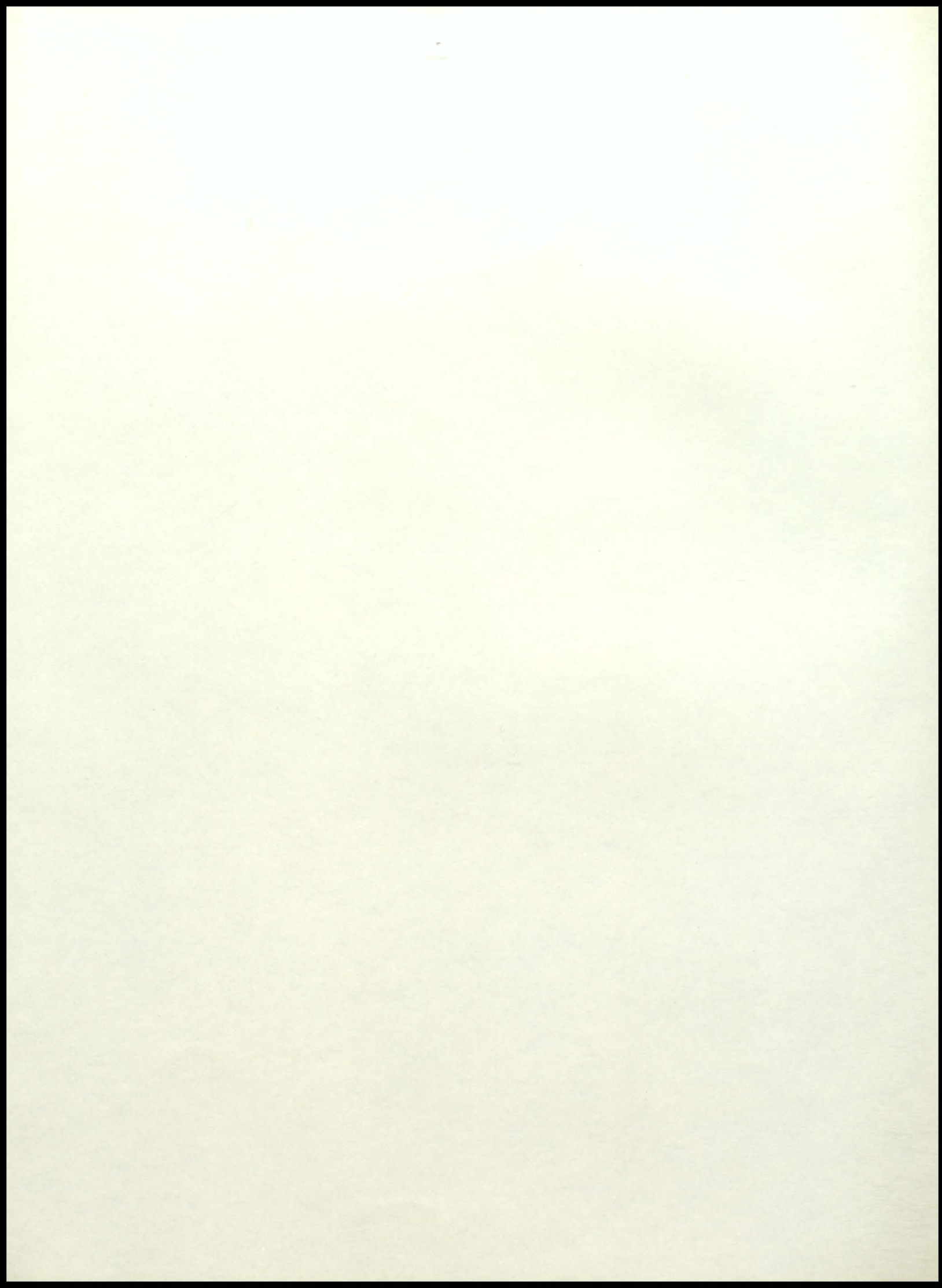

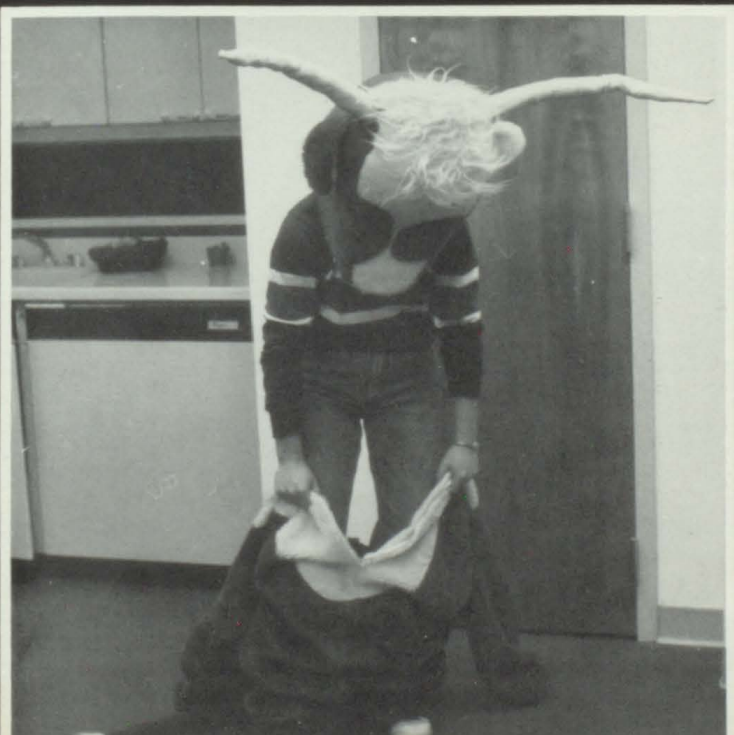

"I don't know how he does it. Somehow in Drama class he helps us lose all our inhibitions and we really become our characters."

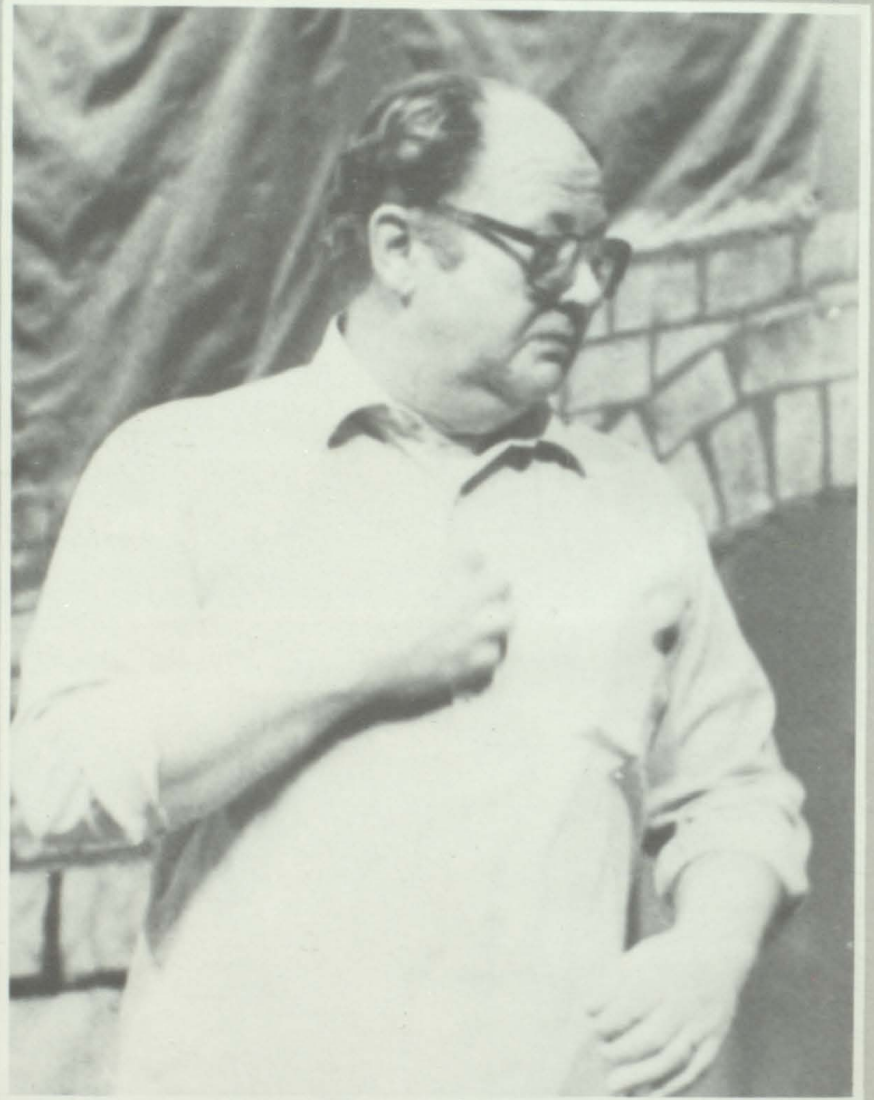

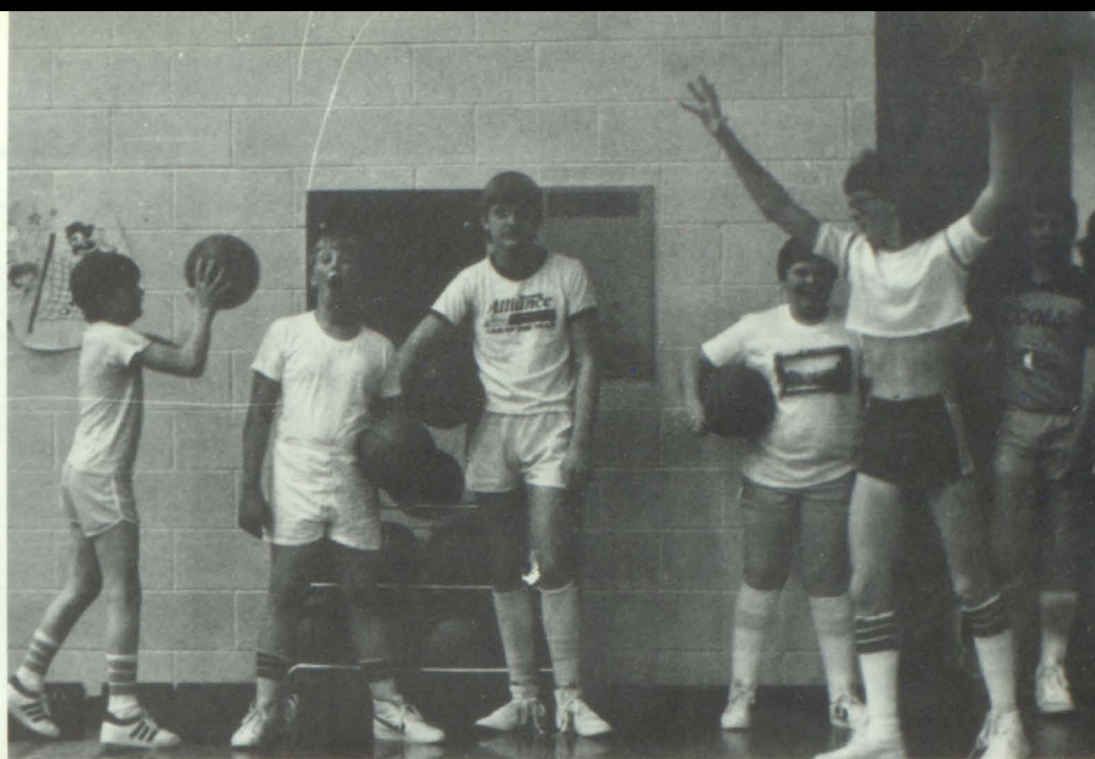

"Beats me! Ask Barracuda, she understands this typing stuff."

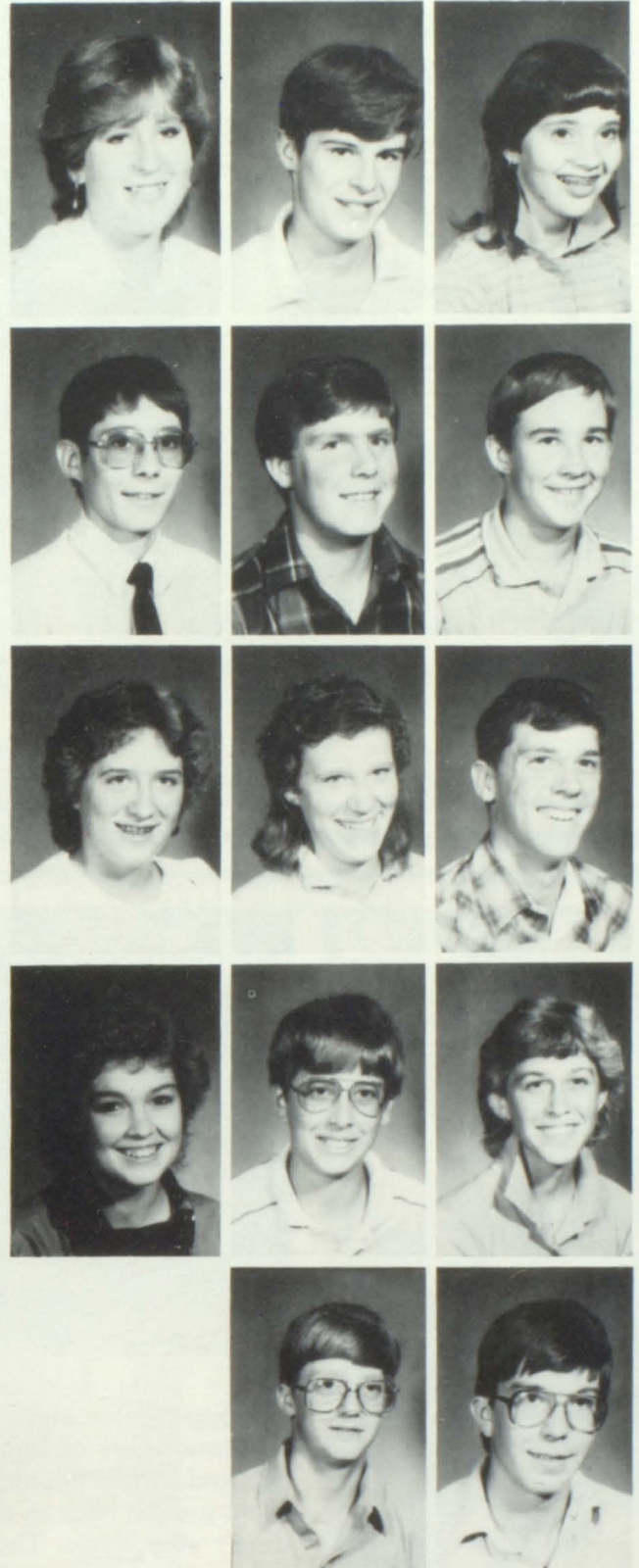

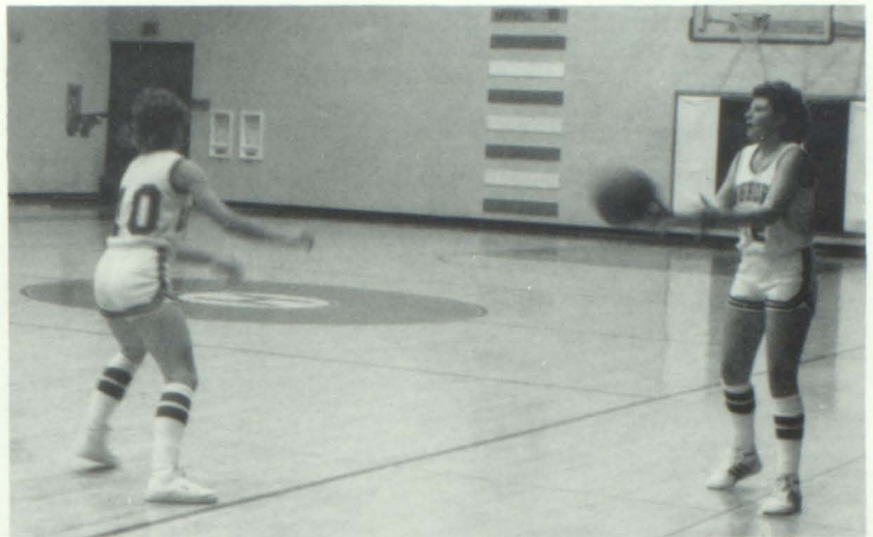

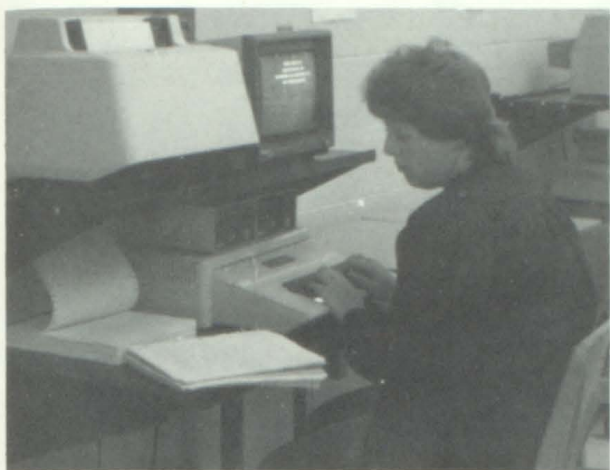

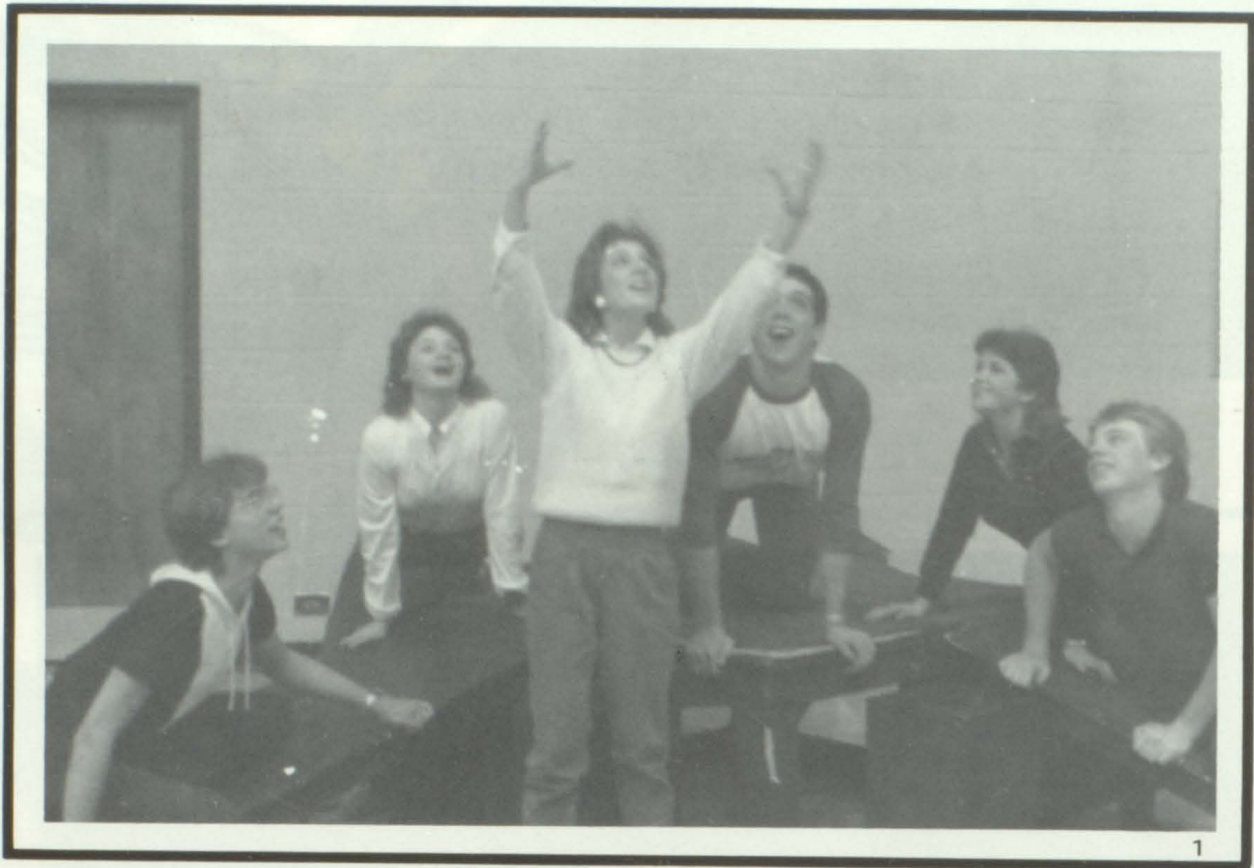

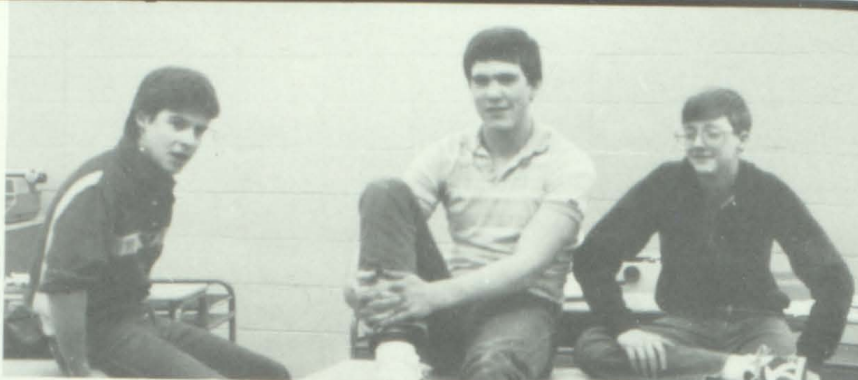

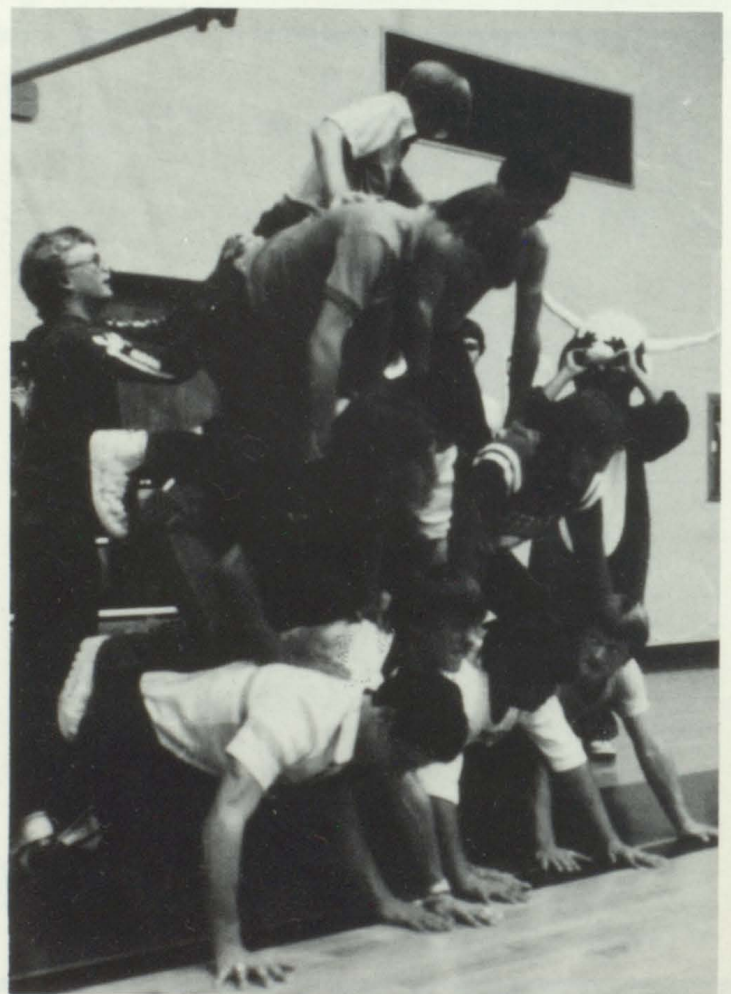


## ***We Are The LONGHORNS***
