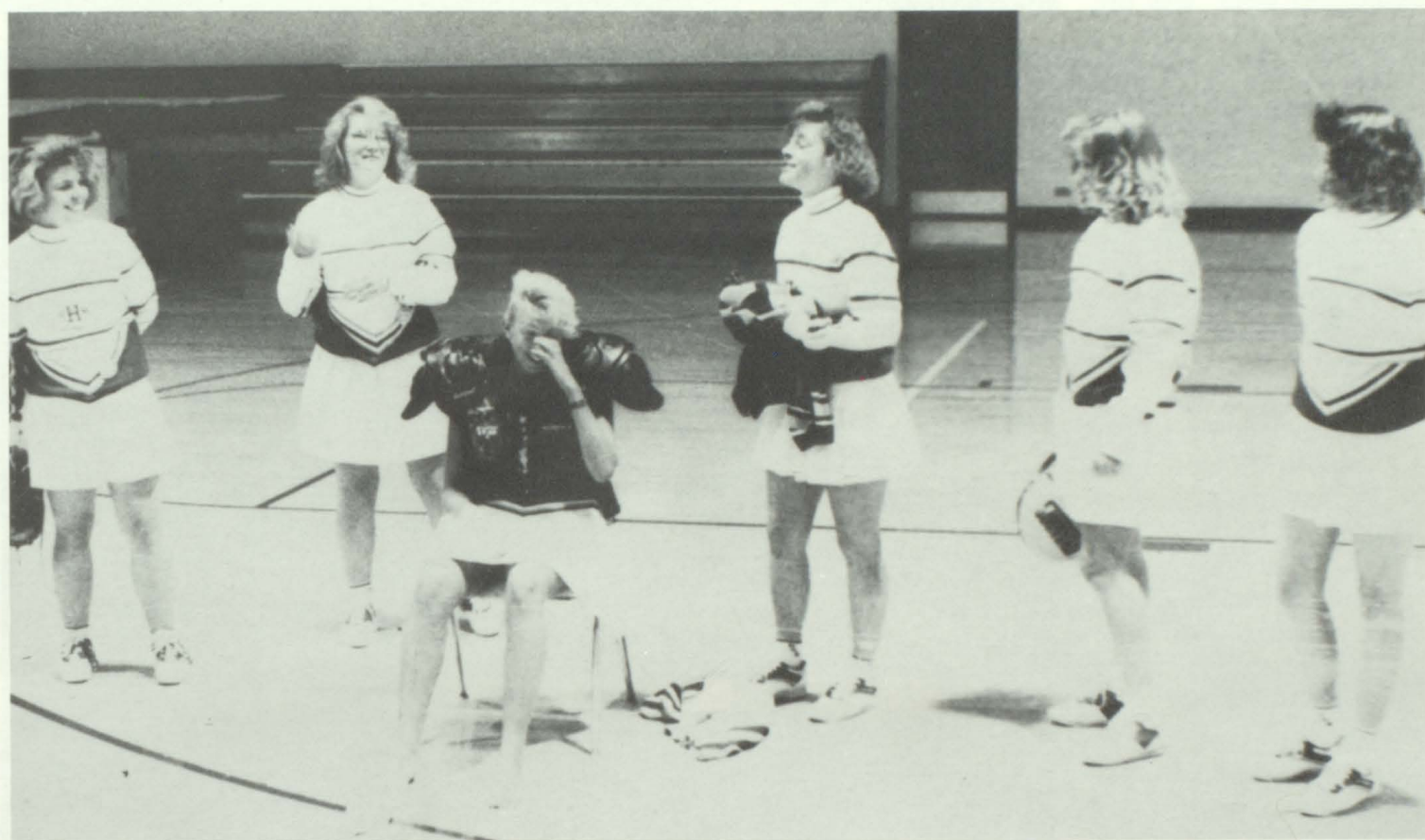

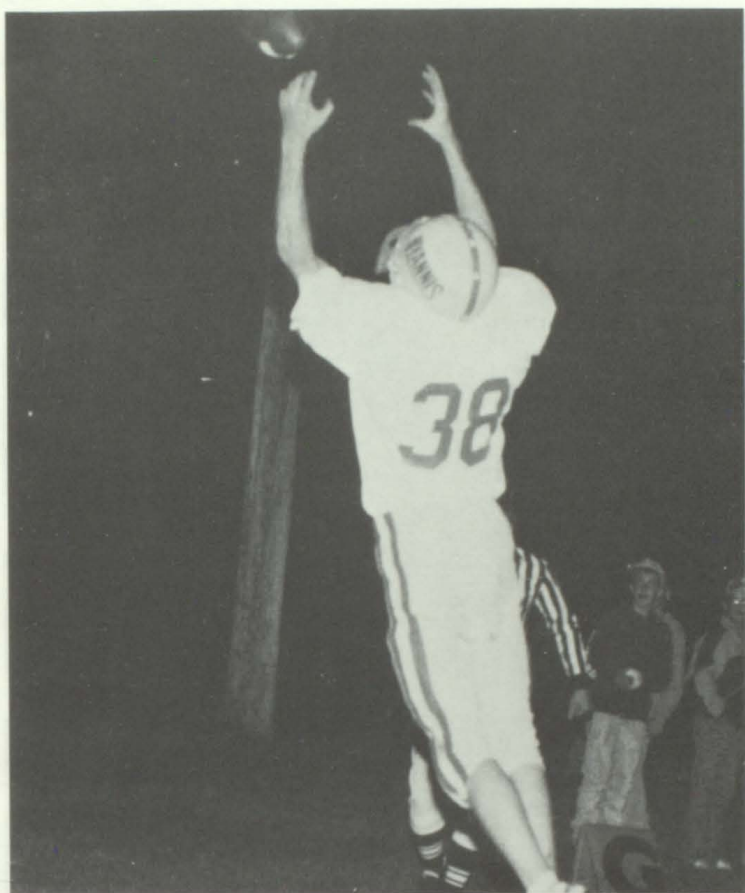
horns had a 3 — 6 record. The JV's had two game with Mullen and won both of them.

Volleyball has even season, ends 9-9.

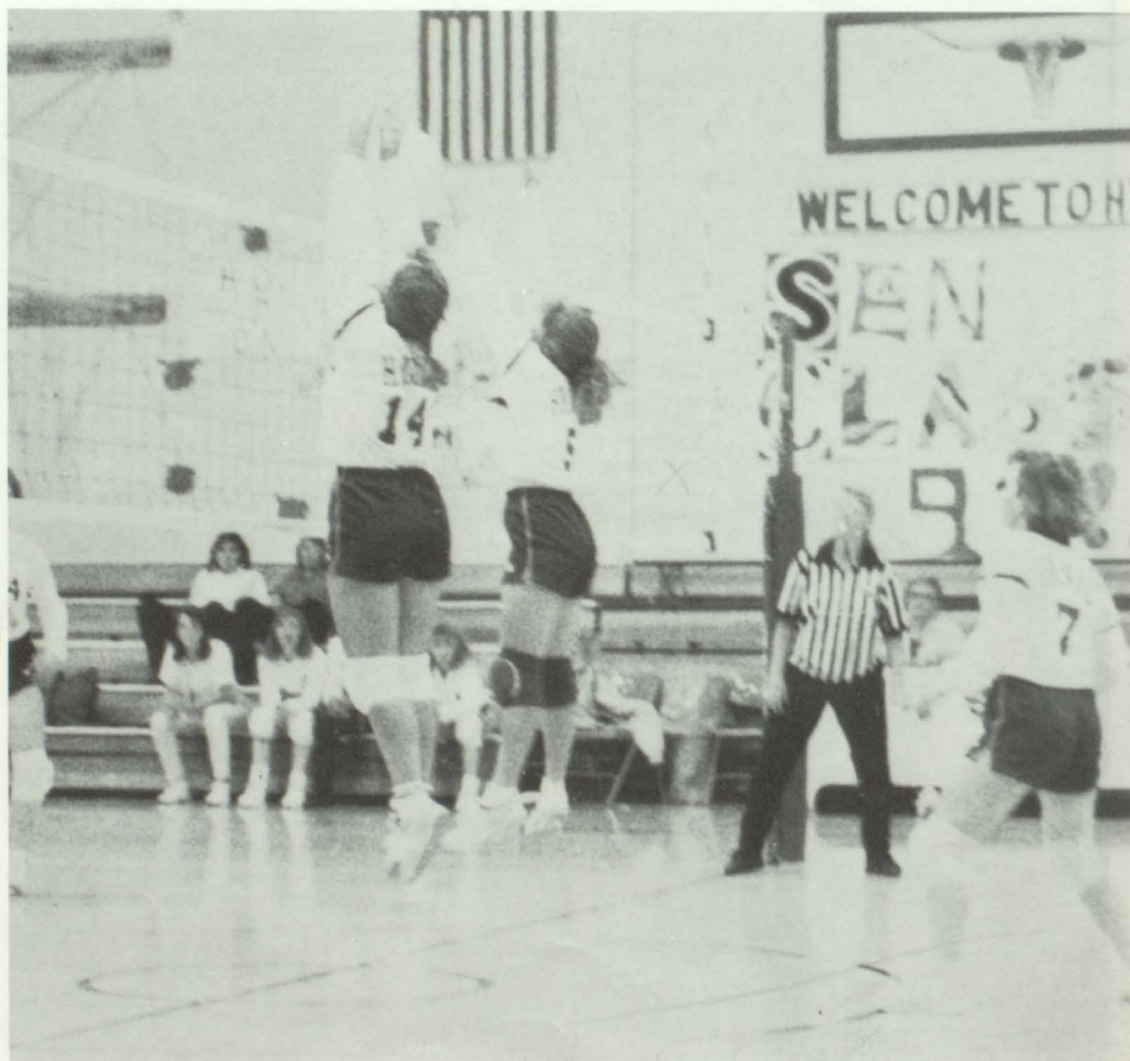

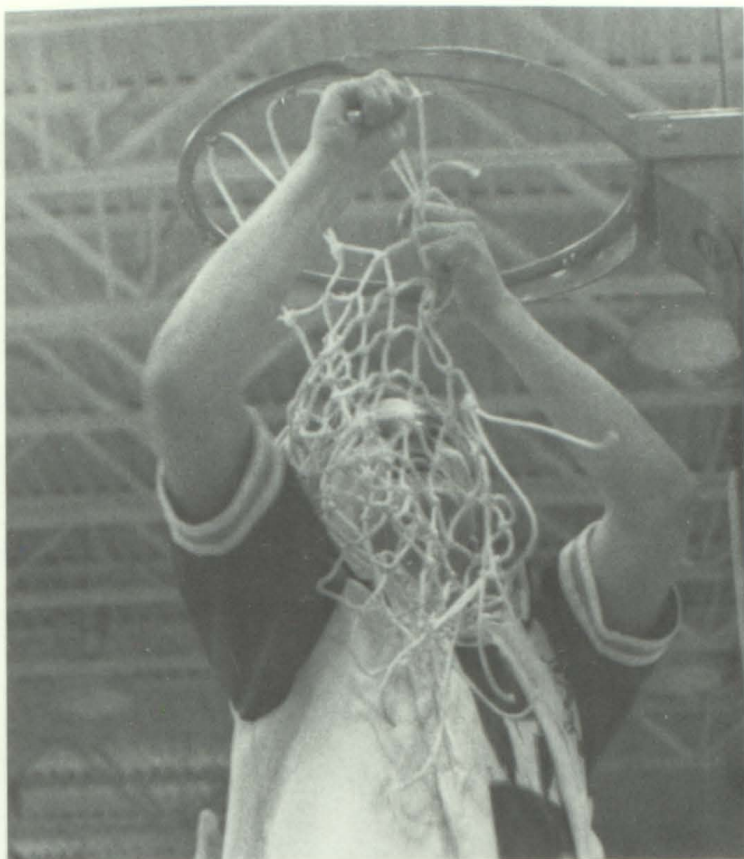

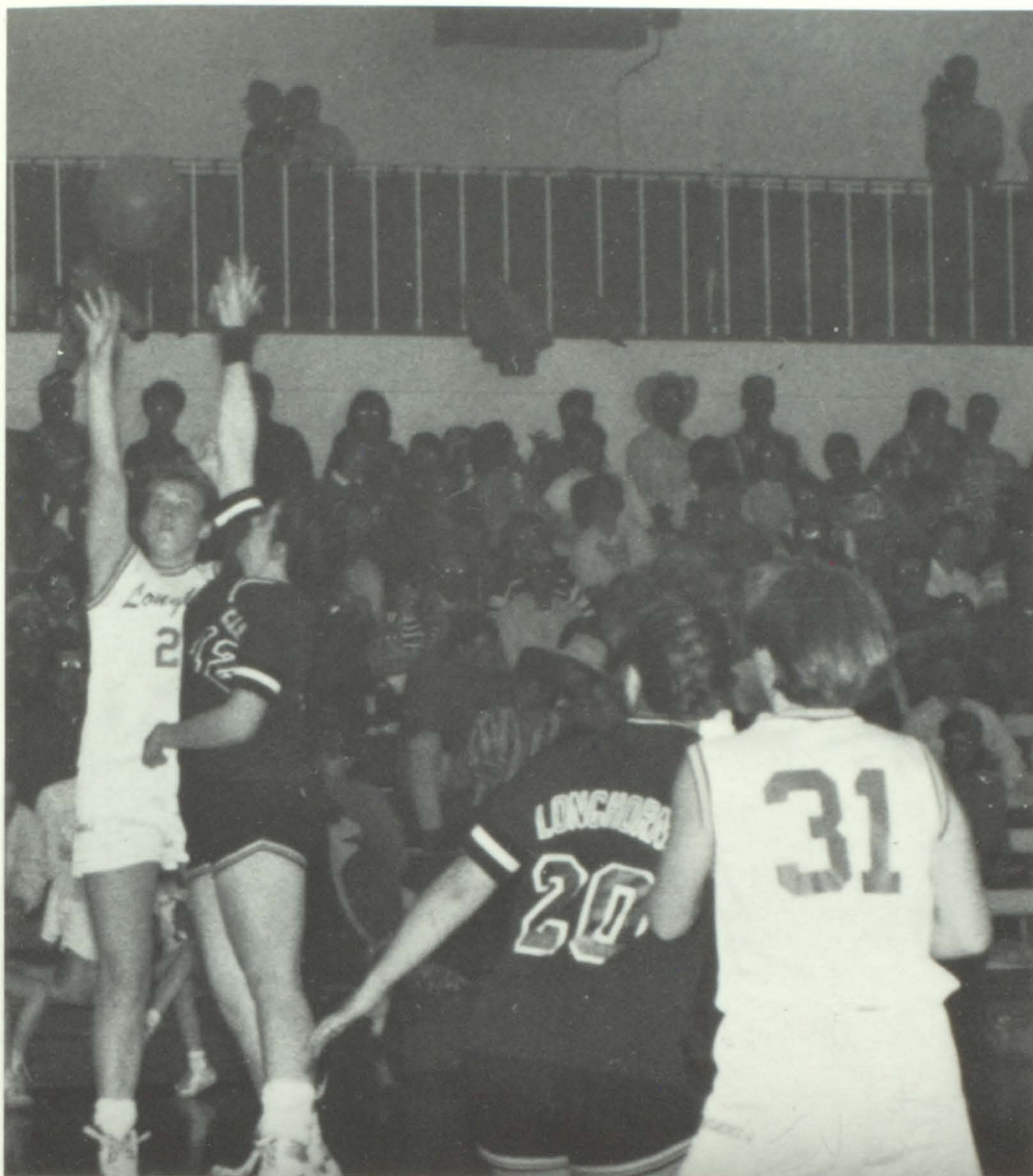

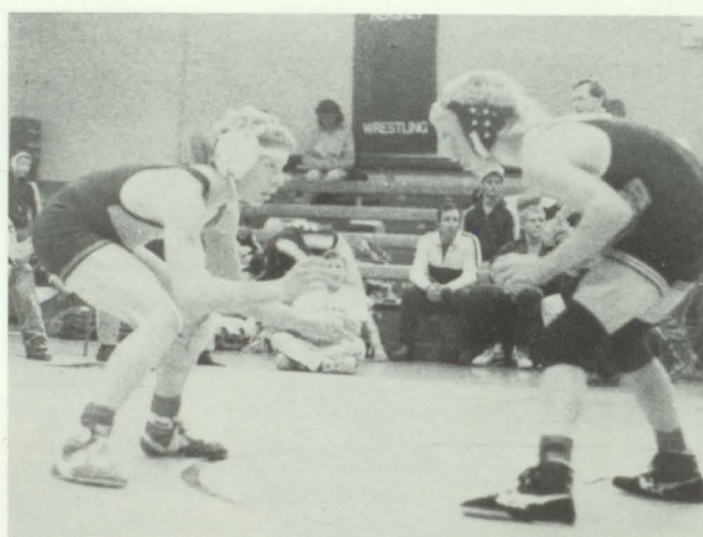
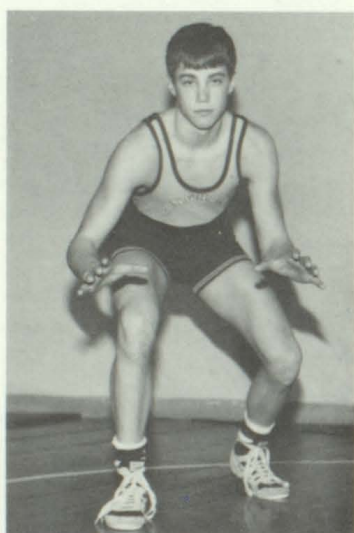
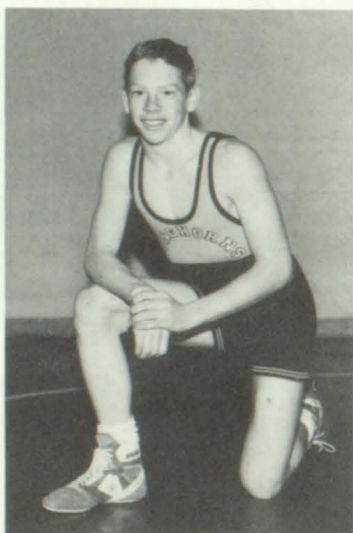
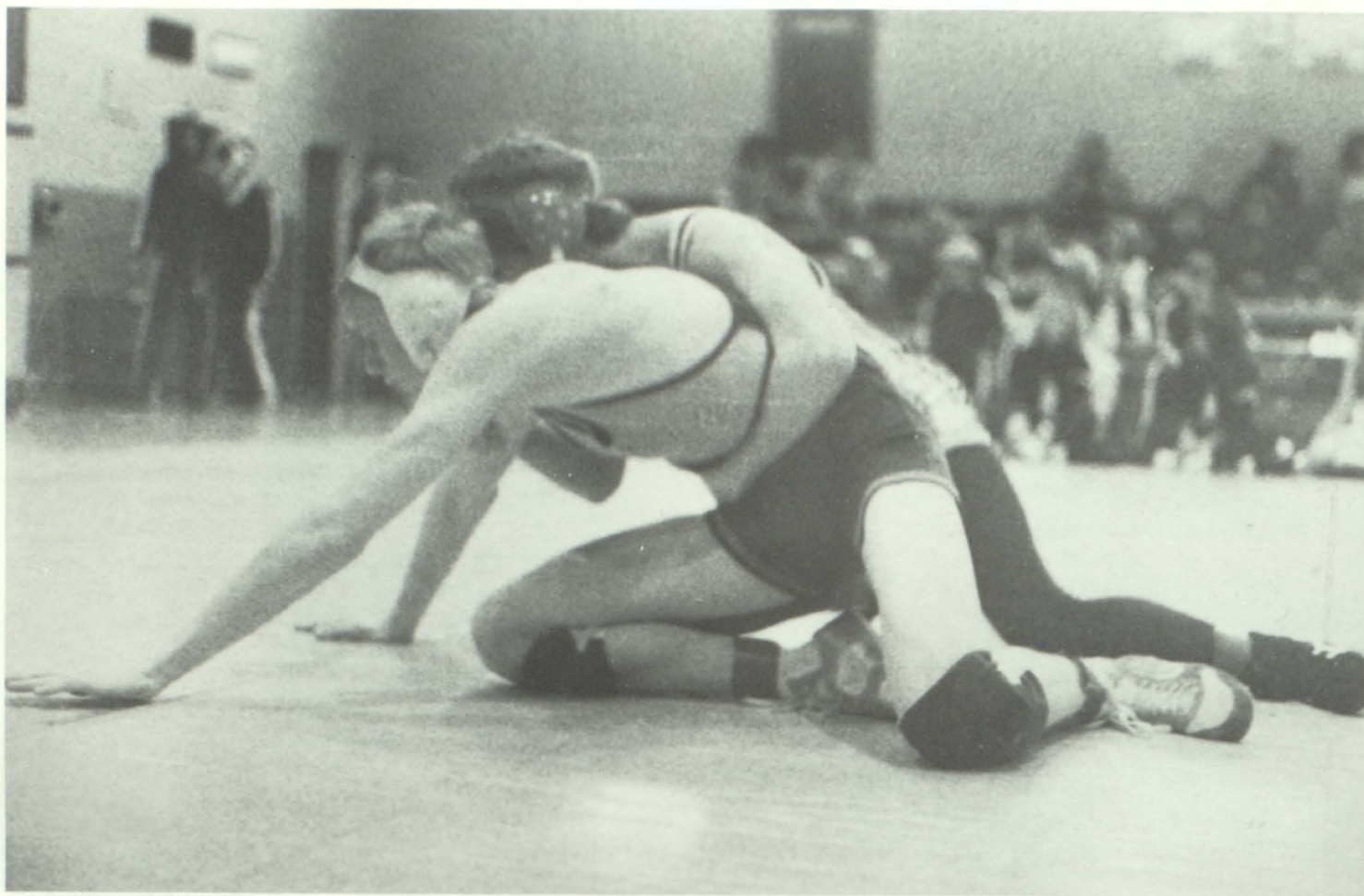
High School Track

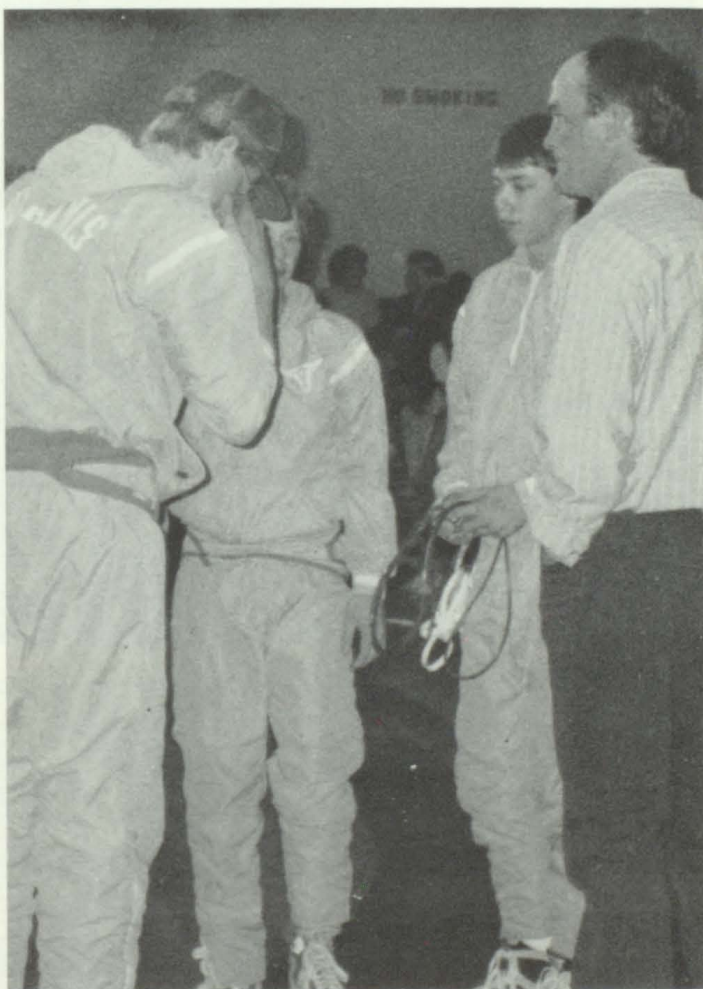


Wrestlers fight back despite small numbers.

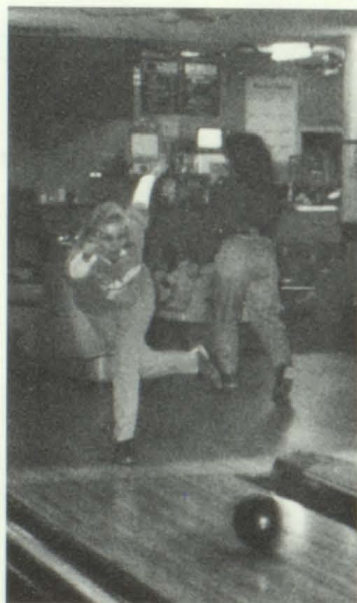
Spirit Upped by H — Club

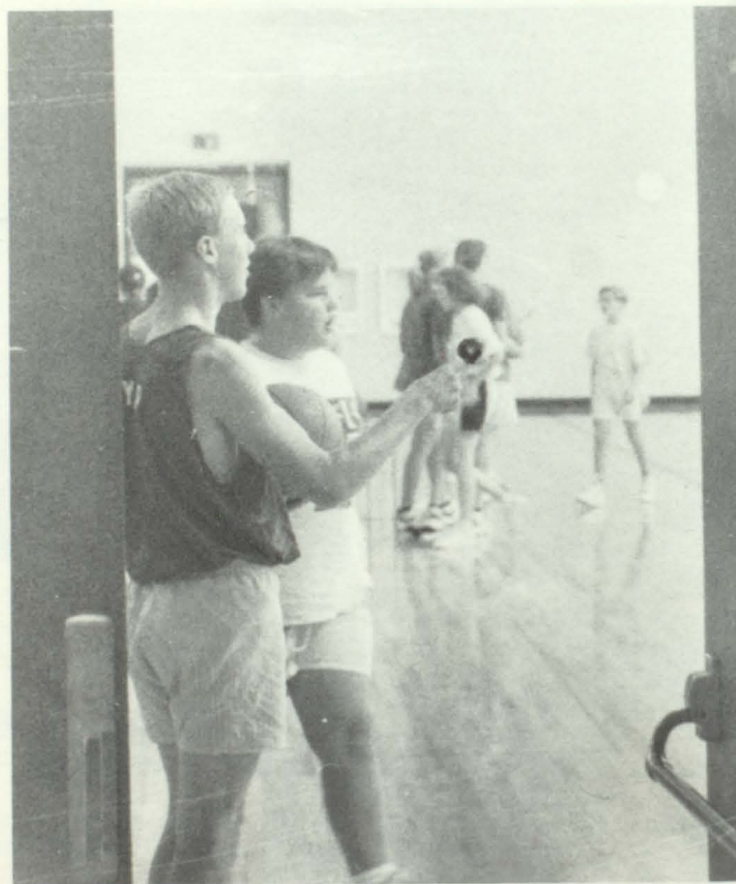
Let's Get Physical

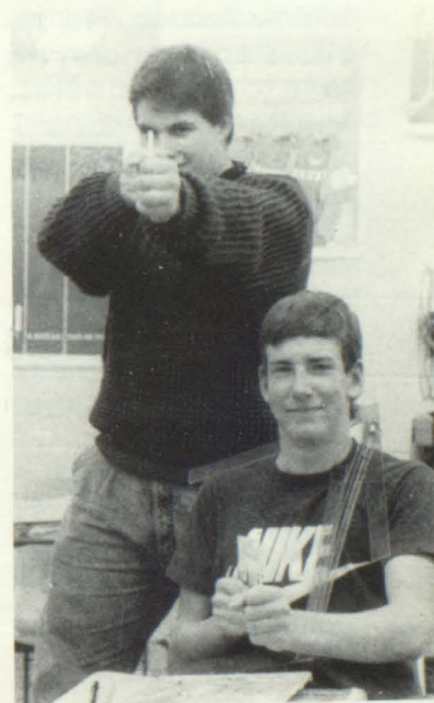

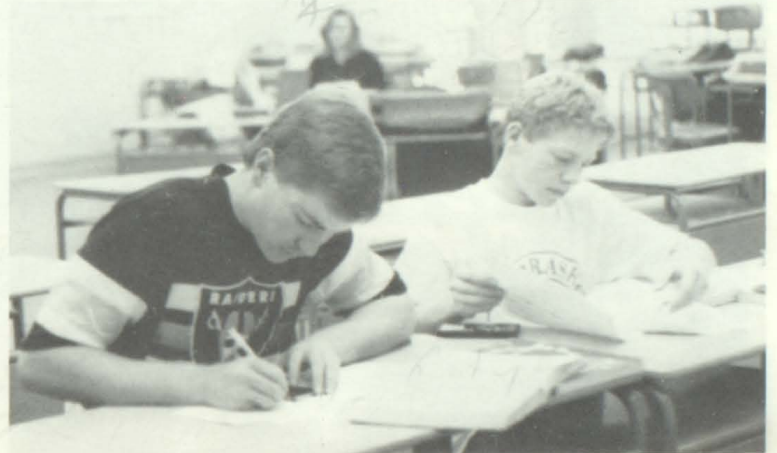

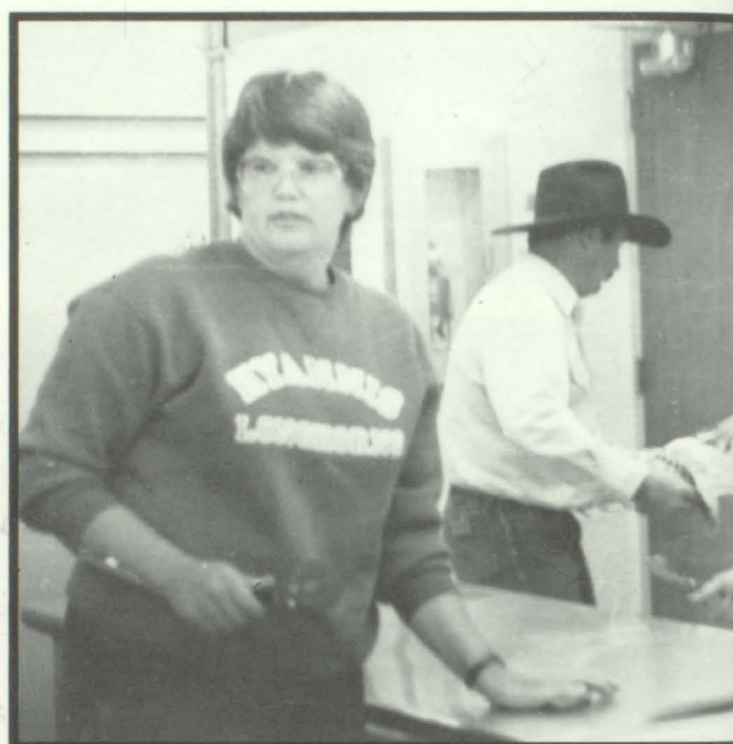


Students Learn Life Skills

Vocational classes help students learn about every day living and make use of available resources. Home economics doesn't just teach the basics of sewing, but more of how to invest money, buy a house and car, raise a child, and feed a family nutritionally. 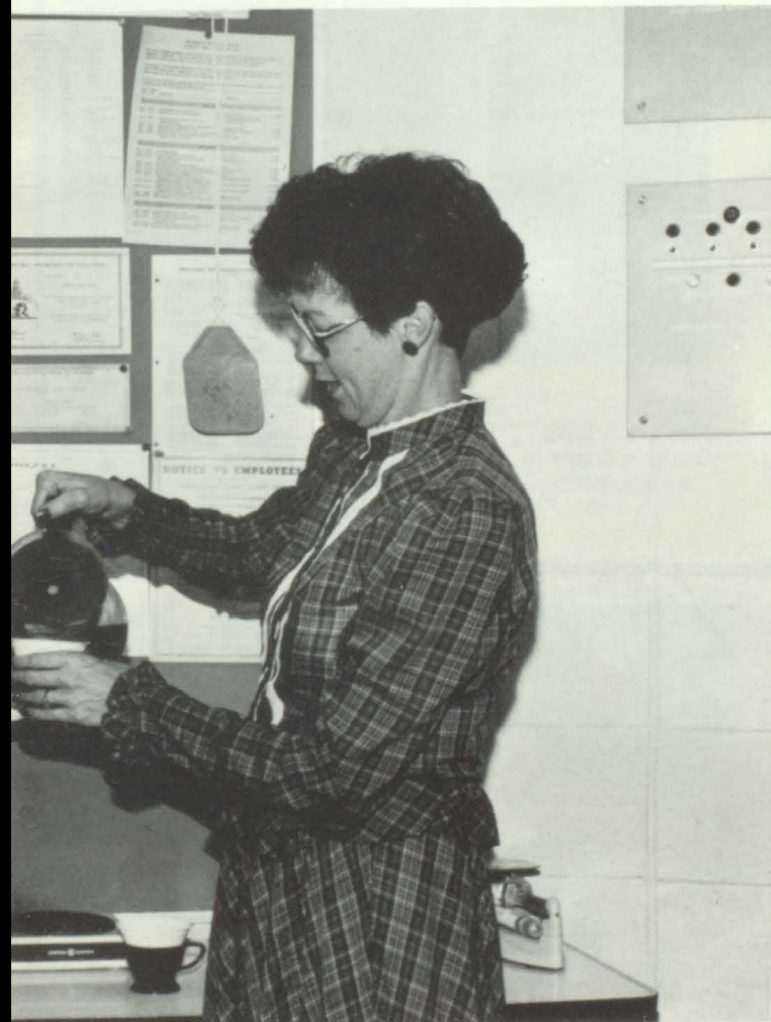
Support Staff Sizzles

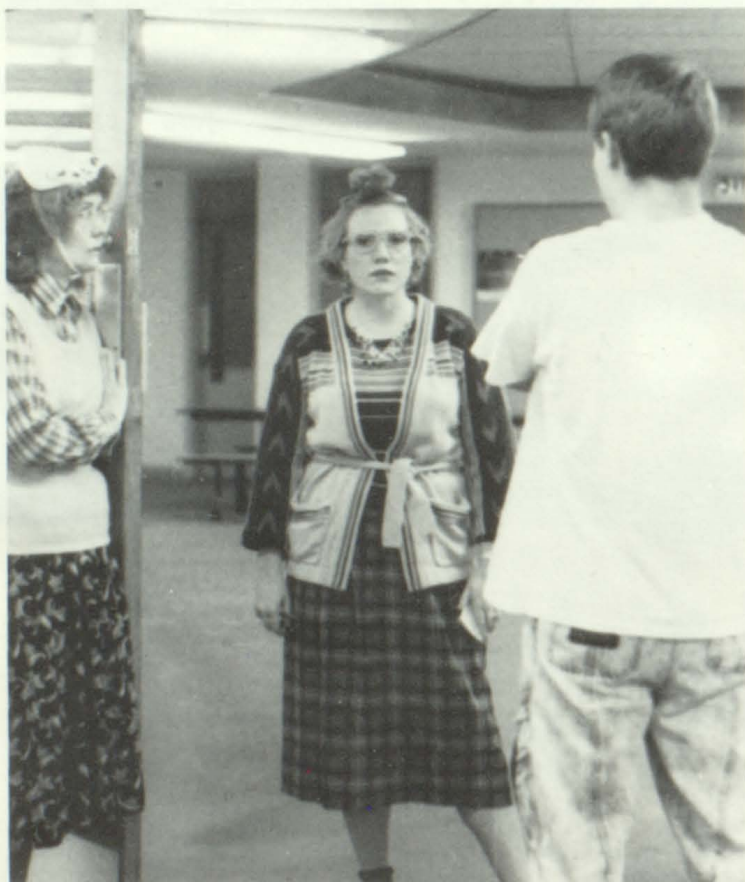

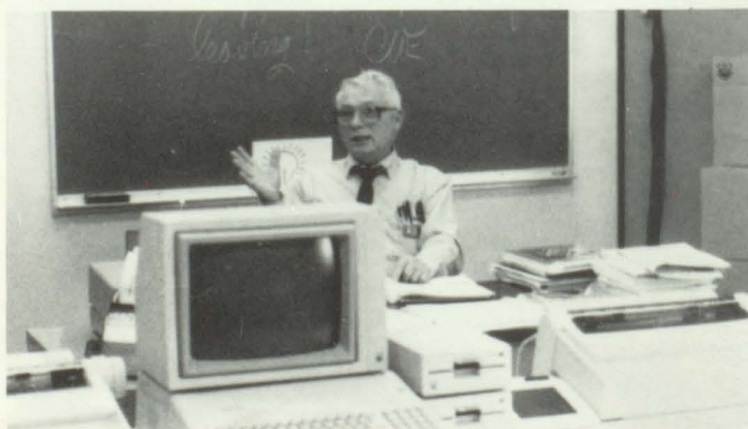

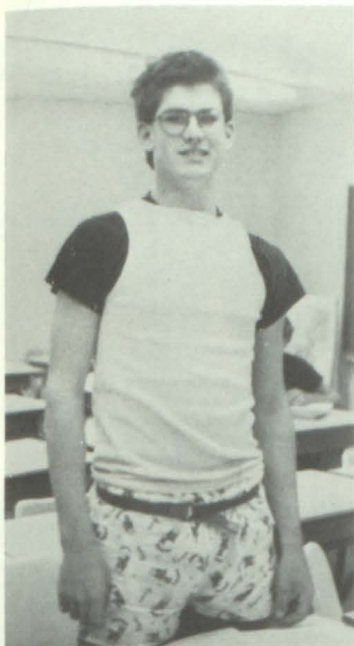
Total Blowout Hyannis wins three

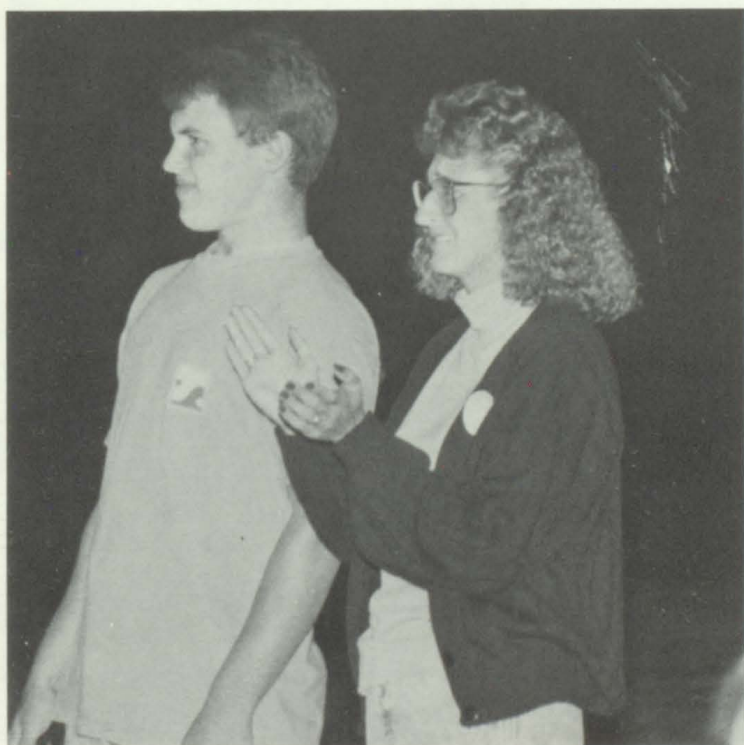

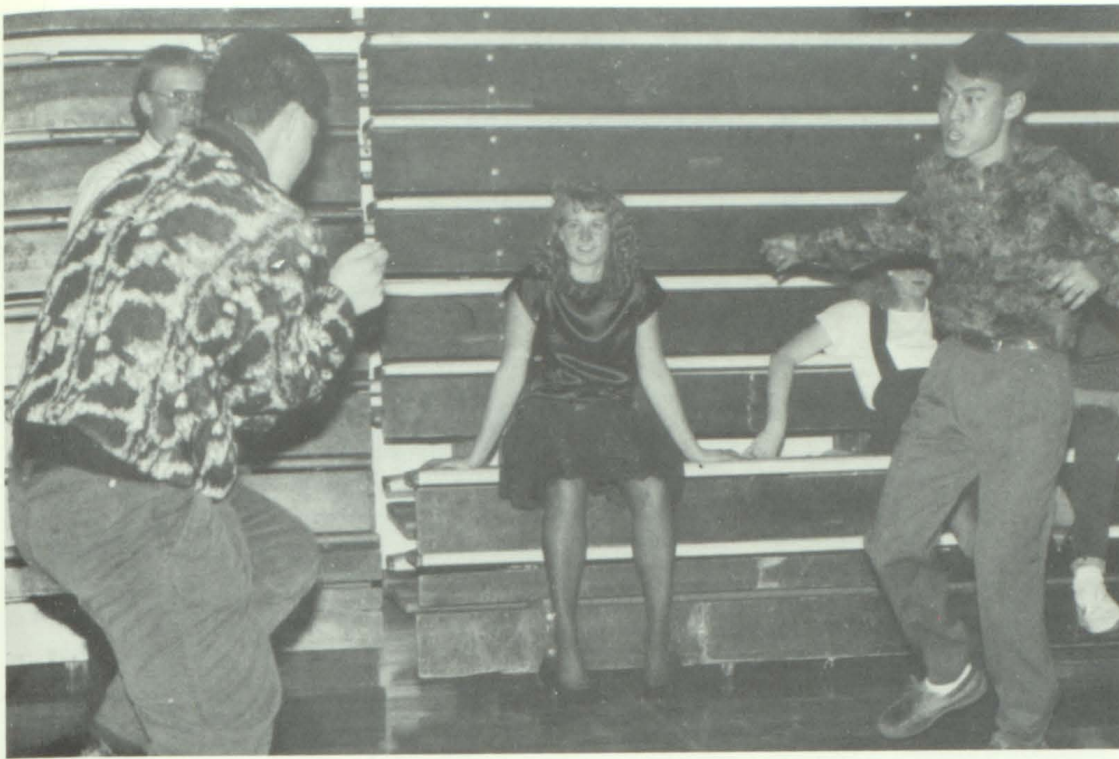

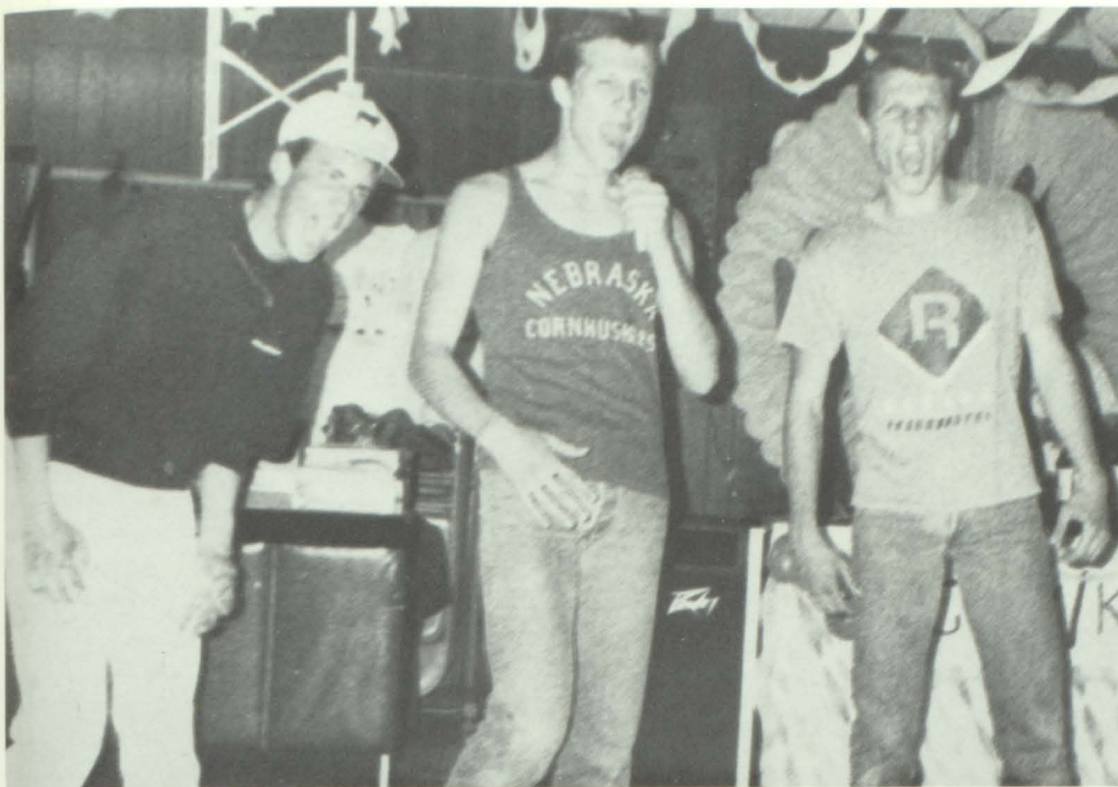
Heaven The Gates of Heaven Open Into 1991 Prom.
