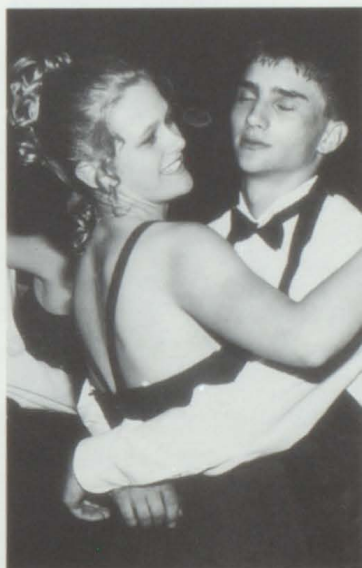
# In The Beginning

# Good-bye Class Of 1998

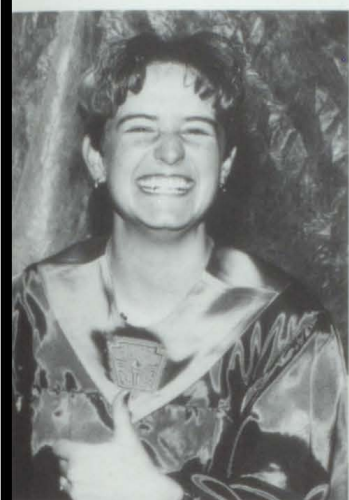

The Lady Longhorns came out on top in three sets sending the team into the Championship round against Fall City Sacred Heart. The Longhorns battled for two long sets to become the 1997 Class D1 State Runner-Up. The Lady Longhorns ended their season with only four losses to Bridgeport, Oshkosh, Lodgepole, and Fall City Sacred Heart.

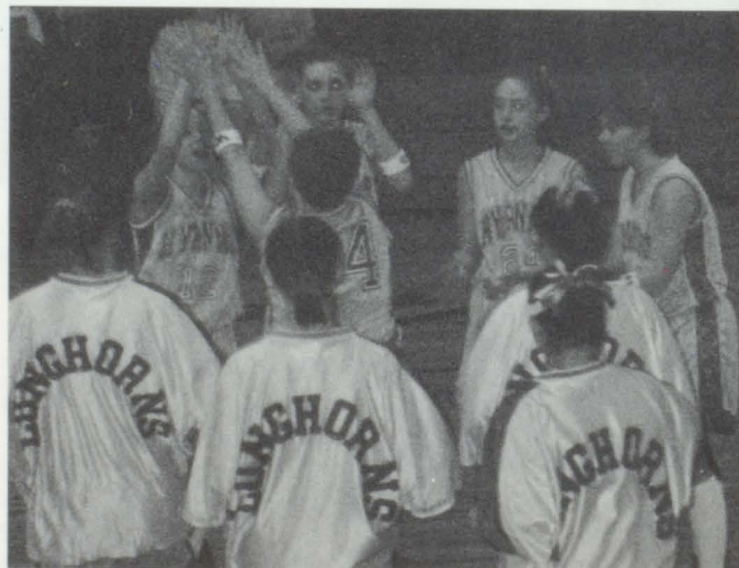


# Lady Longhorns Finish 17-2

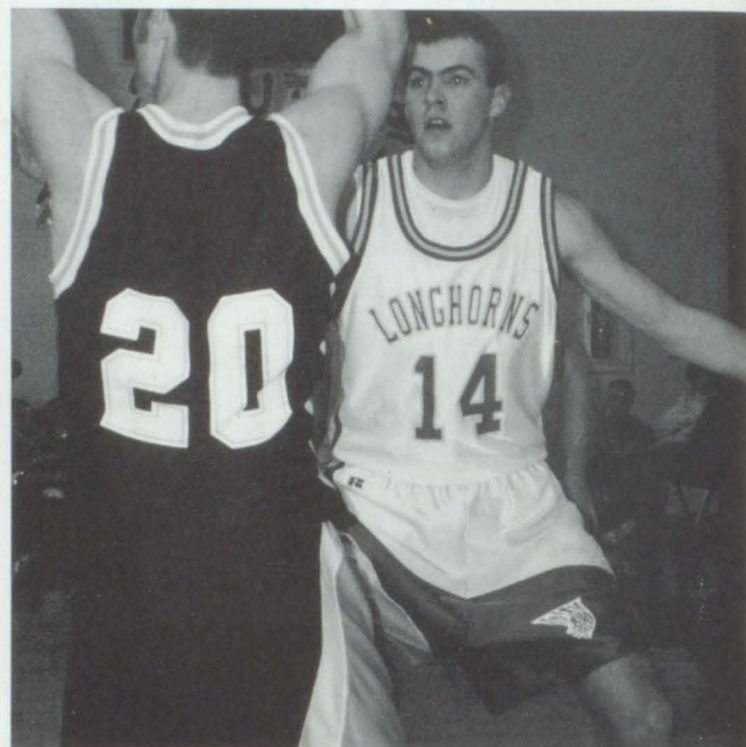
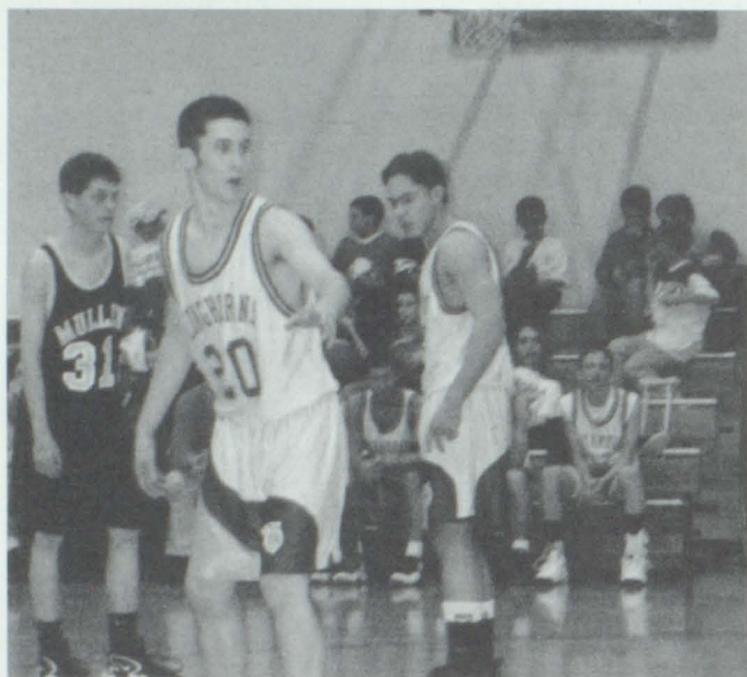

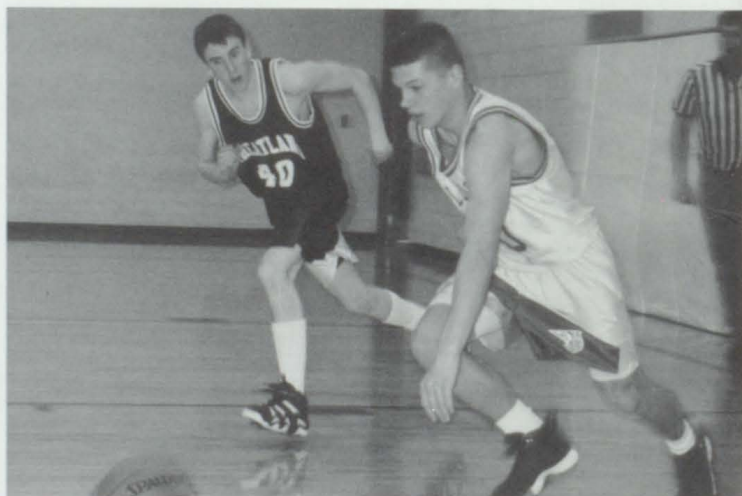


# Longhorns Battle To State

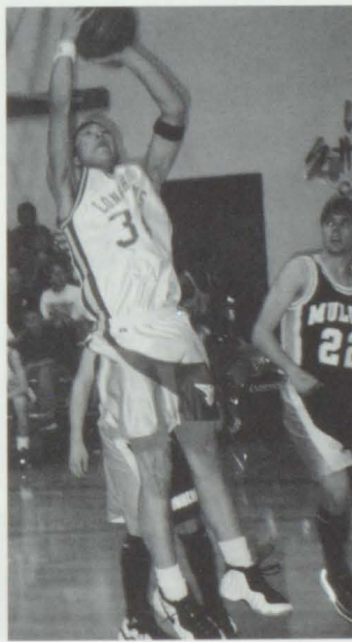
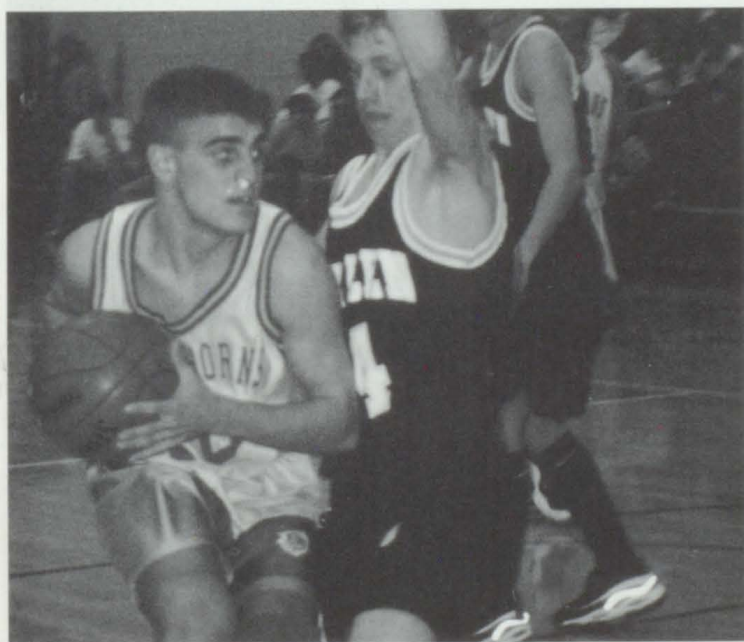

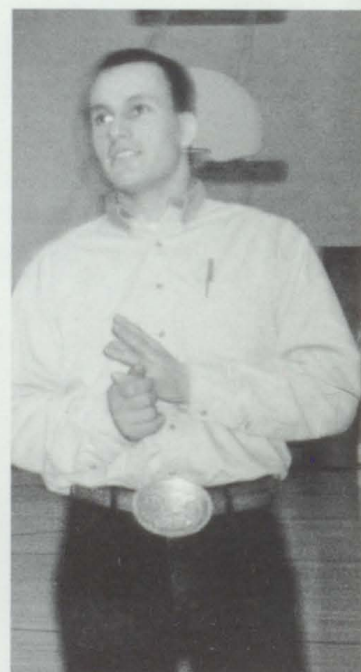
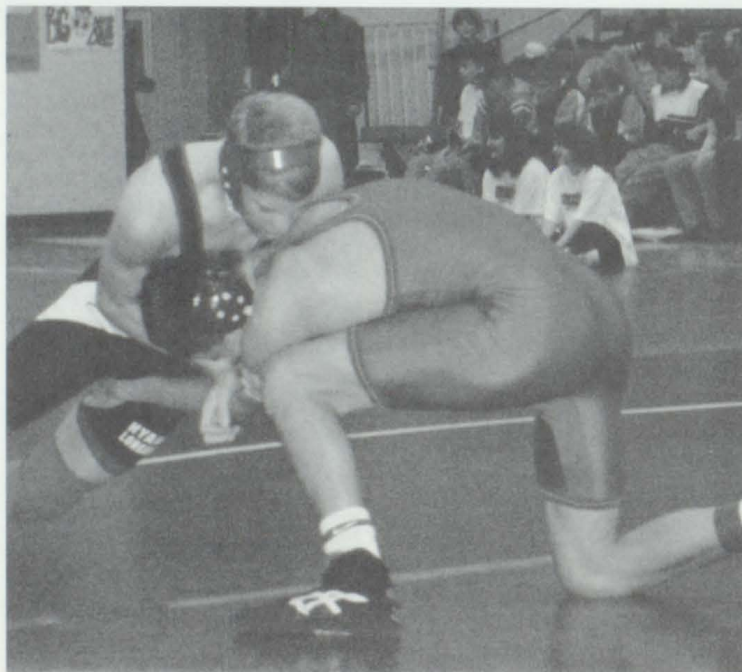


# Wrestlers Fair Well

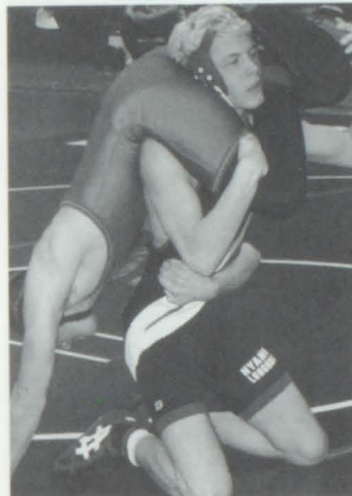
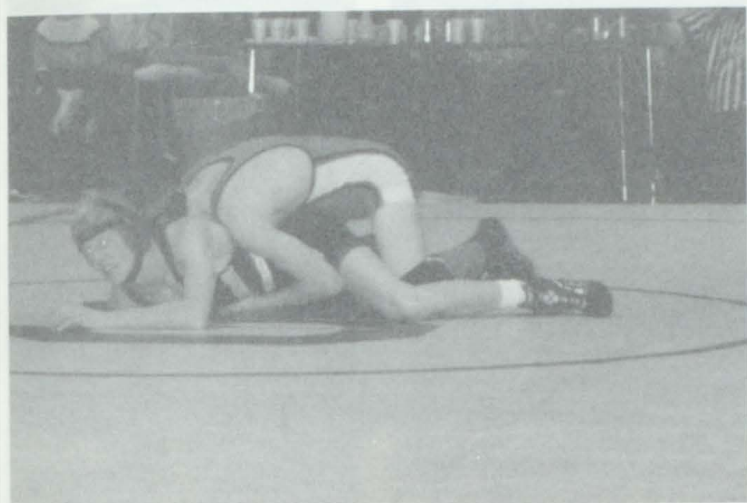

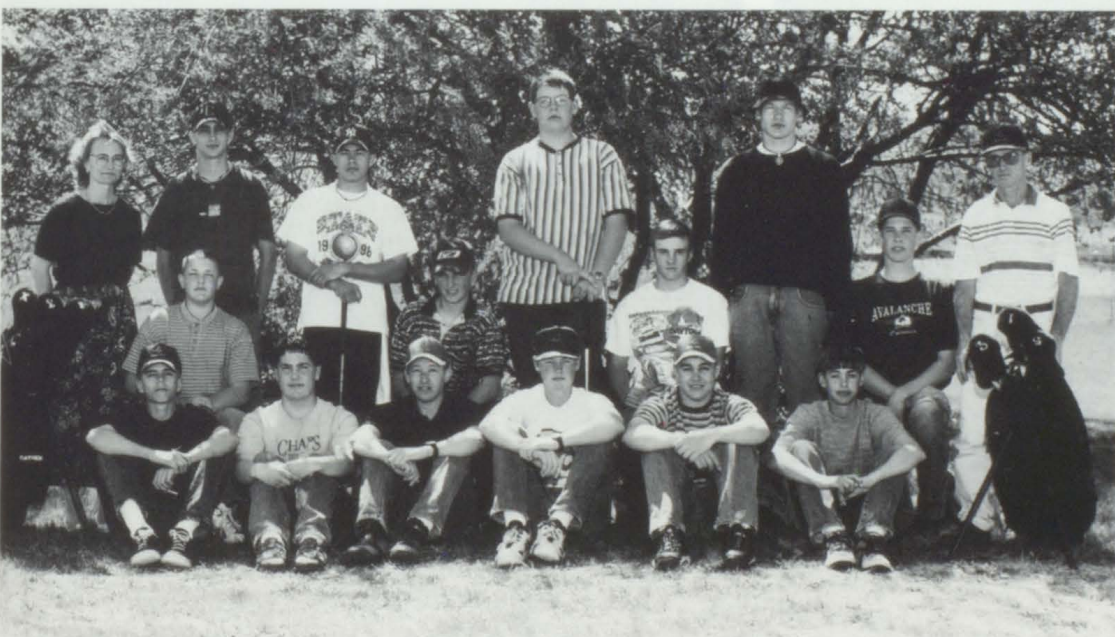

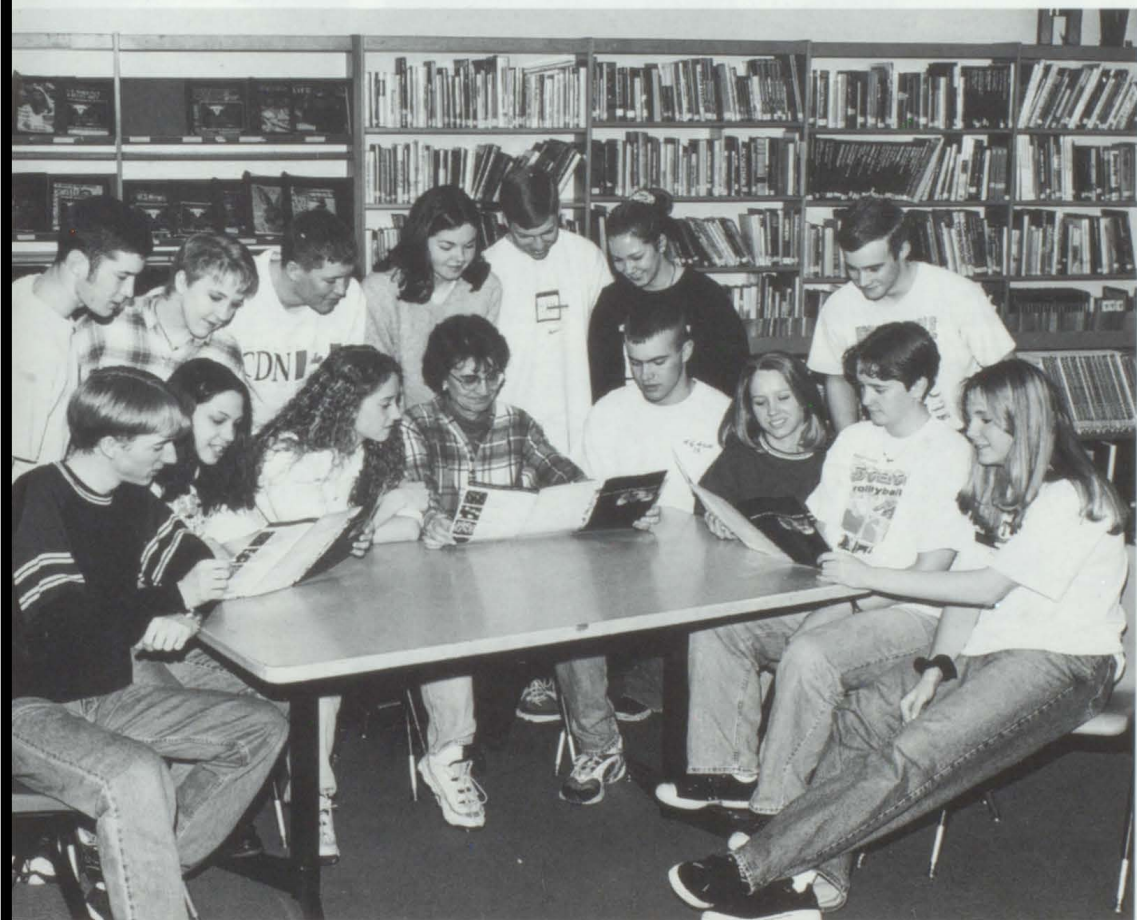
# Student Council

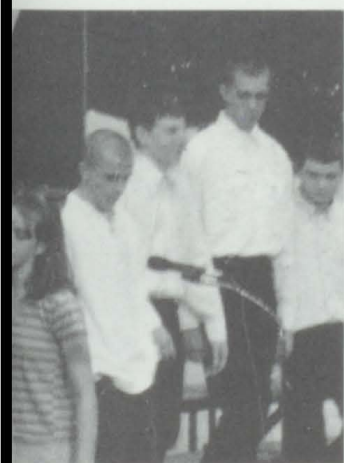

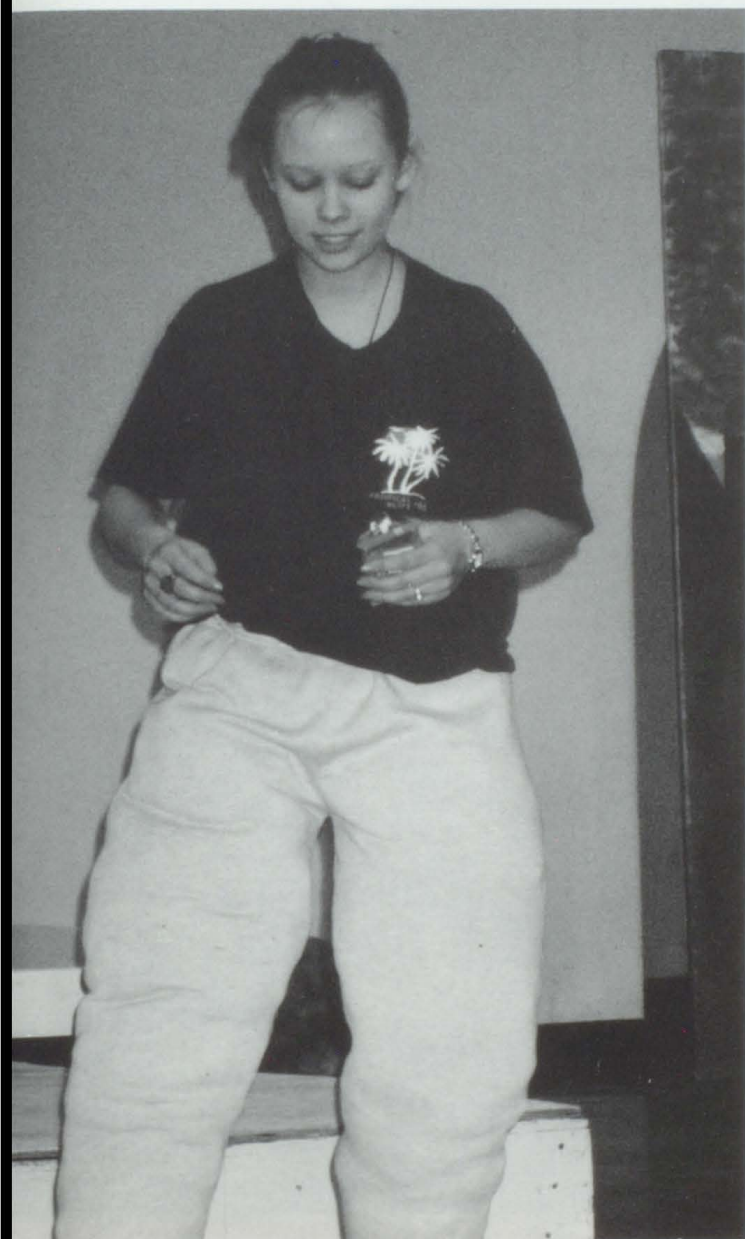
# Krazy Kamp

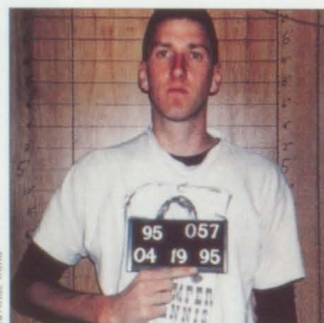

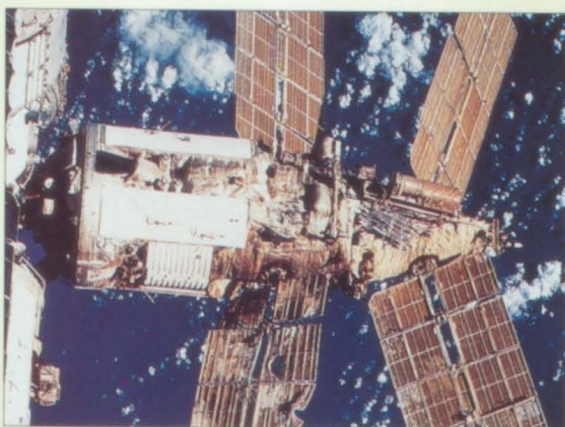

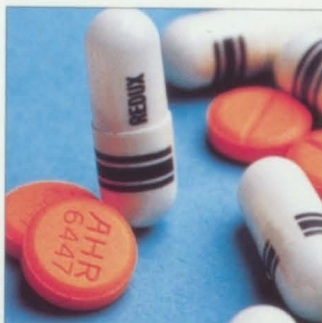

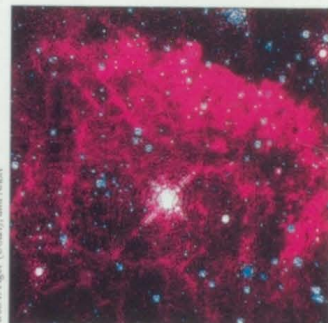

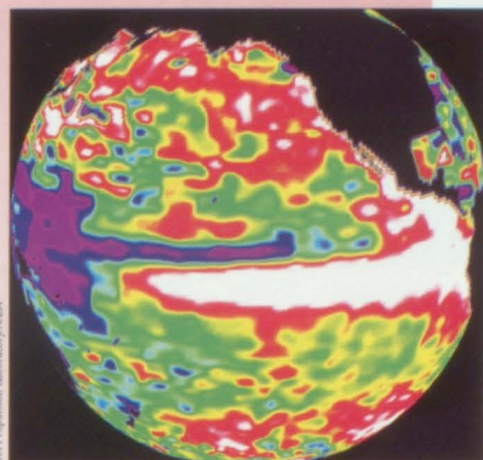

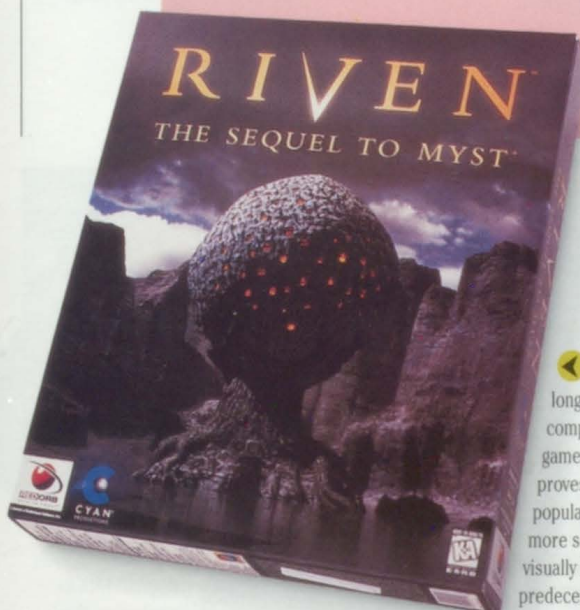

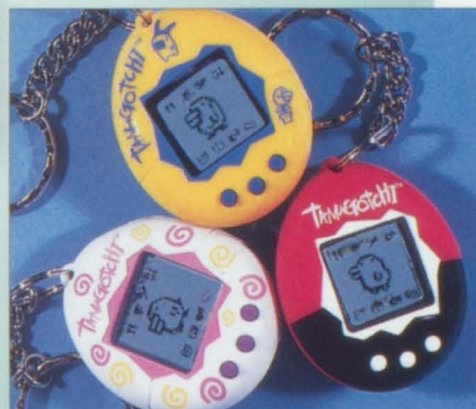

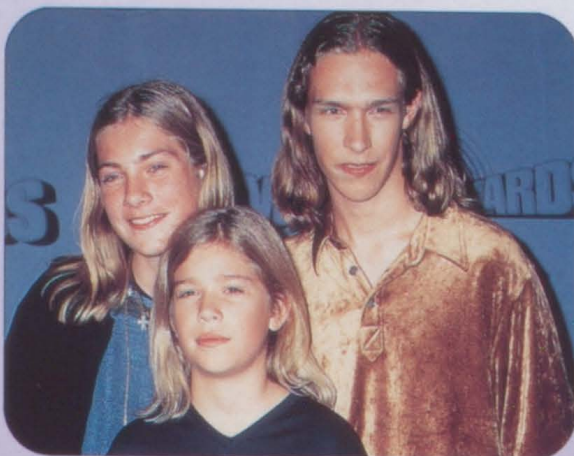

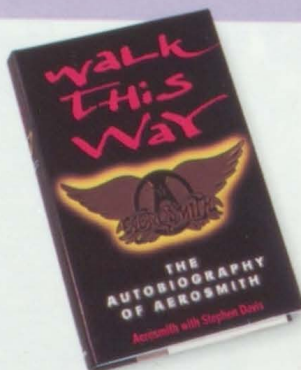

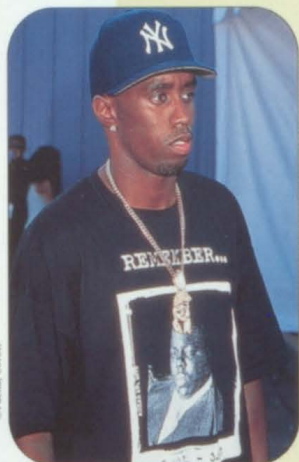

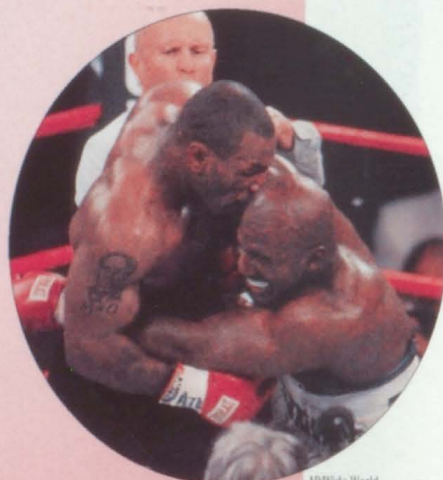

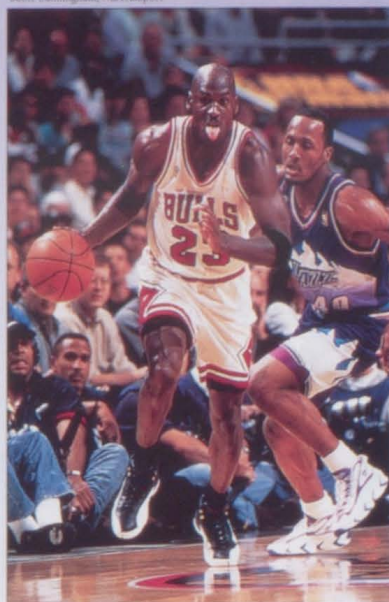

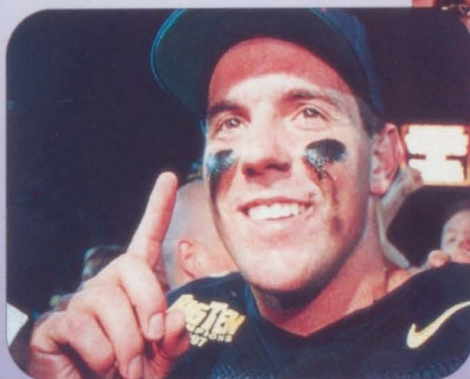
