Black marks were made by the sophomore class as they spun their tires in the school parking lot. As most freshmen became sophomores, they experienced the thrill of receiving their driver's license.



























The leading scorers of the total season, with 21 games, were Jill Edelman with a total of 150 points, Krystal Craig with 132, Tara Haney with 102, and Abbey Shaffer with 81. The most 3 point field goals were made by Brenna Rothwell with 10 and Marcee Keslar with 3 goals.

With only 14 girls out, they all worked together and never gave up.
































